KEY CLUB

The Marquette High Key Club is a service oriented group affiliated with other national Key Clubs, the high school organization sponsored by the Kiwanis Club. The Key Club is involved in many projects around school. The most ambitious project of the year is the Rummage Sale held in October in conjunction with the Mothers Club. This year's record sale raised over \$2,600 for the high school scholarship fund. The Rummage Sale was under the direction of Mrs. Jeanne Brossard and Mrs. Carole Carter.

The Key Club's "Project '75" is a program which provides tutoring for over 30 Black students. The students are tutored every Tuesday night of the first semester in hopes that some of the boys will be able to attend Marquette High in the Fall. Senior Lyle Stein coordinates the program.

Juniors Bob Chaney and Lou Teresi headed a Thanksgiving Basket Drive which obtained food for Milwaukee's needy families. Over 800 cans of food and 40 turkeys were collected.

Seniors Keith Schaetz and Paul Langer are President and Vice President of the Club respectively. Fr. John O'Brien has been moderator of the club since its inception in 1968.
